A little something about our cellar

When I first came to this hotel for my job interview, more than seven years ago, I was astounded at the cellars and the amount of stock. Cases of wine were stacked six tall, on both sides of a very narrow corridor down the length of the cellar. In the heart of the cellar, a cage stood, packed to nearly the top with Burgundy, three rows deep. It was amazing, over 2000 bins of wine, some 35,000 plus bottles, with names I had previously only dreamt about – Pétrus, Domaine de la Romanée Conti, Krug, Harlan Estate and many more. I knew this was somewhere that I wanted to be a part of.

Over the last six years I have tried to develop the list further, keeping on top of changing trends in wine-styles, new countries coming into the UK market and always keeping the menu and customer in mind. We have seen the number of wines sealed with a screw cap jump from zero to over a hundred. We have added more and more wines from the “New World” until the list was almost at parity with the “Old World”. Over the last two years we have watched as our customers tastes moved back to the “Old World”. We have changed the layout of the list three times, and I am currently planning a fourth revamp.

Each year we invest into the cellar, buying key wines *en primeur*, which is a daunting task, selecting wines that wont be delivered for another two years. This has enabled us to offer high-

end wines at a reasonable price, compared to their market value. We continue to invest in this way now, although the wines we are selecting have changed to account for changes in style and to a lesser extent, my own personal preferences!

These last few years have seen us exploring new options in the way that we serve wines, offering a tasting selection of wines by the carafe to complement the tasting menu. This has proved to be quite popular with many people and has given me the opportunity to introduce some wonderfully interesting wines from across the globe, as well as the odd beer or two!

I would like to think that we have something within the wine list for everyone. I have compiled what I believe to be a wide ranging wine list. Full of classic wines from the regions best producers, as well as a few quirky little wines from smaller winemakers trying to produce something a little bit different. I feel there should be something here to suit all tastes, whether you like bone dry, or sickly sweet whites, light and fruity or big powerful red wines. If you cannot find something that you desire, please ask, as our cellar is stocked full of many wonderful wines and I’m sure we can find something to help you enjoy your experience in Simon Radley’s all the more.

Corkage Policy.

It is the hotels policy not to allow corkage. If you have a specific wine that you would like and it isn't in our wine-list, we should be able to source a bottle given reasonable notice. Please contact the sommelier (garry.clark@chestergrosvenor.com) or restaurant manager (carlo.iulianella@chestergrosvenor.com) with any queries.

Glassware.

In the same way that our Chef, Simon Radley, only uses the finest ingredients and equipment, so we feel that our wines deserve the best stemware. We use Riedel glassware in the restaurant. For more than 50 years, Riedel have been designing and producing glassware to suit specific grape varieties, enhancing your experience of the wines. For white wines we use Riedel Sauvignon, Riedel Montrachet and Riedel Viognier glasses. Our red wines are served in Riedel Bordeaux and Riedel Burgundy Pinot Noir glasses, with some special wines being served in Riedel Sommeliers Grand Bordeaux and Grand Burgundy Glassware. We are also proud to use Riedel Decanters. The decanters we use are the finest handblown decanters made by Riedel, and we use certain decanters for specific wines. The main design in use is the Riedel Cornetto, but we also use the Riedel Pinot Noir Decanter, Riedel Cabernet Mini, Riedel Syrah and we are pleased to be using the newest designs – Touch, Smile and Bliss.

As the glassware is handblown, you can expect to find very slight variations between individual glasses.

Decanting.

Certain red wines would be decanted as a standard, either to remove any sediment from the wine, or to aerate the wine and open up the flavours/aromas. If your wine hasn't been decanted and you would prefer it to be, then please ask and we will be happy to do so. We would typically decant certain white burgundies and some of the more oaky styles of chardonnay, again just to open up the wines slightly and allow more of the complex flavours to shine.

266 Te Mata, "Woodthorpe", Chardonnay, Hawkes Bay 2007 42.50

It became fashionable to "hate" chardonnay a while ago, and while there was certainly merit in the backlash against aggressively overoaked chardonnay, it has meant that many wines are being underappreciated.

Te Mata's "Woodthorpe" Chardonnay is a wine that deserves a second chance, give it the opportunity to win you over with its subtly elegant structure giving the balance between a reasoned use of oak, both new and old, and the crisp defined flavours of the Chardonnay grape.

1395 Puligny-Montrachet, 1er Cru "les Enseignères" Lucien Le Moine 2008 130.00

Mounir Saouma and his wife Rotem Brakin have established Lucien Le Moine as the rising star estate in Burgundy. This micro-négoce has a talent for selection the best fruit and barrels of wine from Mounir's extensive contact list. The domaines they buy from are the who's who of Burgundy. Limiting each cuvee to one or two barrels ensures that the quantity available is always in top demand. The elevage is carried out in their own cellars with limited battonage and little or no additional sulphuring. The wines are bottled by hand, using gravity feeders and bottled with no dosing of sulphur. As such these are as close to natural wines as you can get, with little or no manipulation in the winery.

1246 Casa Marin, Syrah, "Marimar" Vineyard, San Antonio, Chile 2007 70.00

Until Maria-Luz Marin had the courage to plant in the San Antonio region, no-one thought it was suitable for making wine. With over a decade of experience and passion for the region and its unique qualities, Casa Marin is now one of the most exciting wineries in Chile. The sweeping hills lead down to the Pacific Ocean which exerts its cooling influence on the wines. The intense minerality of the fruit, the vibrant aromatics of the grape varieties shown at their very best. Here it shows in a lush concentrated black fruit character with dark cocoa notes and peppery spice notes on the finish.

644 Mascarello e Figlio, Dolcetto d'Alba, Santa Stefano di Perno D.O.C. 2006 45.00

The Mascarello family have been producing wines in the Piedmont since 1881. Original founder, Giuseppe was a vine-tender for a prominent local family in La Morra until establishing his own winery in Monforte d'Alba. The fruit comes from the Santa Stefano vineyard in Perno in the commune of Monforte d'Alba. Fermented in large Slovenian oak vats, the wine exhibits aromas of dark red fruit, black cherries and a touch of something floral, perhaps violets.

There are 24 houses that form the Syndicate des Grandes Marques. These are the powerhouses of champagne whose consistency from year to year has defined our perceptions of champagne. Each with their own unique style and presence. The sheer volume of wines produced by the Grande Marques is staggering, somewhere between 4 and 10 million bottles per house per annum. Much of their fruit is therefore coming from contracted farmers who sell their fruit to the houses at prices dictated by the CIVC, the governing body of Champagne.

The Grower Champagnes

I believe that these wines offer a truer representation of Champagne as a region, by being more specific to their terrior, offering a differing style that reflects the difficulties of growing grapes in a marginal region like Champagne.

Bordeaux White

Made from a varying mixture of Sauvignon Blanc, Semillon and sometimes a touch of Muscadelle. The Sauvignon gives crispness and acidity, the Semillon fattens the wine out and adds a bit of backbone, while the Muscadelle adds a certain floweriness to the aromas and checks the acidity in place.

Personally I think there is a place for both, and I've selected some which I feel show all the characteristics of both schools to their advantages.

From the dense inky Barossa Shiraz' with their typical aromas of menthol, black pepper, eucalyptus and dark red fruits, to the raw intensity and almost liverish character of a Coonawarra Cabernet born of the rich terra rossa soils there.
